The 42nd Indiana Infantry: Proudly Carrying on the Tradition

For May, the MCCWR welcomed Pvt. Stewart DeVane, a reenactor with the 42nd Indiana Infantry today and a caretaker of the original Civil War regiment. Formed in Evansville in 1861, the 42nd served with distinction until its final march with the Grand Review in Washington on May 24, 1865.

During its long term of service, the 42nd actively participated in, among others, the battles and/or campaigns of Perryville, Kentucky in October, 1862; Chickamauga in September of 1863; Missionary Ridge in November of that year; Sherman's March to the Sea culminating just before Christmas in 1864 and Bentonville, NC, in March of 1865.

Mr. DeVane also spoke of the life and accomplishments of many of the actual members of the 42nd. One person he highlighted was George Kirkpatrick who enlisted at the age of 15. Mr. DeVane discussed Kirkpatrick's service with Roundtable member Gerald Spore, who happened to be a distant relative of the former Civil War soldier. It was left up to those in attendance to determine if there was any family resemblance!

Mr. DeVane's excellent delivery and his dress as a simple, common soldier helped to enhance the experience and made a few members anxious to attend the 42nd's next "muster" at Spring Mill State Park on the Memorial Day weekend.
